From video to terrorist attack: a definitive timeline of administration statements on the Libya attack

In any kind of confused overseas event, initial reports are often wrong. But the Sept. 11 attack on the U.S. diplomatic post in Benghazi, Libya, in which four Americans were killed, including the ambassador, is a case study of how an administration can carefully keep the focus as long as possible on one storyline — and then turn on a dime when it is no longer tenable.

For political reasons, it certainly was in the White House's interests to not portray the attack as a terrorist incident, especially one that took place on the anniversary of the Sept. 11 attacks. Instead the administration kept the focus on what was ultimately a red herring — anger in the Arab world over anti-Muslim video posted on You Tube. With key phrases and message discipline, the administration was able to conflate an attack on the U.S. Embassy in Egypt — which apparently was prompted by the video — with the deadly assault in Benghazi.

Officials were also able to dismiss pointed questions by referring to an ongoing investigation.

Ultimately, when the head of the National Counterterrorism Center was asked pointblank on Capitol Hill whether it was an act of terror — and he agreed — the administration talking points began to shift. (Tough news reporting — as well as statements by Libya's president — also played a role.) Yet President Obama

himself resisted using the “t” word, even as late as Tuesday, while keeping the focus on the video in his speech to the U.N. General Assembly.

On Wednesday, however, White House spokesman Jay Carney acknowledged also that Obama himself believes the attack was terrorism — and so more than two weeks after the attack the Rubicon finally was crossed.

As a reader service, we have compiled a comprehensive timeline of administration statements, showing the evolution in talking points, with key phrases highlighted in bold. Many readers sent suggestions for this timeline, for which we are deeply grateful.

We will leave it to readers to reach their own conclusions on whether this is merely the result of the fog of war and diplomacy — or a deliberate effort to steer the storyline away from more politically damaging questions. After all, in a competitive election, two weeks is a lifetime.

Initially, ‘an attack’ — and focus on a video

Yesterday, our U.S. diplomatic post in Benghazi, Libya, was attacked. Heavily armed militants assaulted the compound and set fire to our buildings. American and Libyan security personnel battled the attackers together. Four Americans were killed. They included Sean Smith, a foreign service information management officer, and our Ambassador to Libya, Chris Stevens. We are still making next-of-kin notifications for the other two individuals.

Suddenly, a shift to a 'terrorist attack'

The attack began and evolved and escalated over several hours at our embassy — our diplomatic post in Benghazi. It evolved and escalated over several hours."

"It appears that individuals who were certainly well-armed seized on the opportunity presented as the events unfolded that evening and into the — into the morning hours of September 12th. We do know that a number of militants in the area, as I mentioned, are well-armed and maintain those arms. **What we don't have at this point is specific intelligence that there was a significant advanced planning or coordination for this attack.**

At this point, what I would say is that a number of different elements appear to have been involved in the attack, including individuals connected to militant groups that are prevalent in eastern Libya, particularly in the Benghazi area, as well. We are looking at indications that individuals involved in the attack may have had connections to al-Qaeda or al-Qaeda's affiliates; in particular, al-Qaeda in the Islamic Maghreb."

LIBYANS TAKE STEP TOWARD DISARMAMENT

(SBU) Hundreds of Libyans in Benghazi and Tripoli handed in weapons, including rocket launchers and a tank, at the first of several planned collection drives organized by the army, media report. Embassy Tripoli comments voluntary collections are the first step toward a needed long-term comprehensive disarmament, demobilization, and re-integration (DDR) program to successfully manage the militias. The military is the most organized national security force and the most capable of carrying out these efforts; tension between the military and the relatively weak Ministry of the Interior regarding control of the militia issue will continue to complicate any DDR programs the government undertakes. *(Ops/Embassy Tripoli e-mail, Reuters)*

TWO KILLED IN CLASH AT VENEZUELA CAMPAIGN EVENT

(SBU) Local opposition leaders were shot to death during a confrontation between supporters of opposition presidential candidate Henrique Capriles and President Chavez, media report. Embassy Caracas comments the shooting occurred in Chavez's home state of Barinas and is the most serious incident of political violence to date in advance of the October 7 national elections. Six people allegedly affiliated with Chavez's party were detained in connection with the shooting. Capriles' party issued a statement condemning the killings, reiterating its commitment to peace, and calling on Venezuelans to protest the violence by voting for Capriles. *(Ops/Embassy Caracas telcon, AP)*

BO XILAI STRIPPED OF CRIMINAL IMMUNITY

(SBU) The Standing Committee of Chongqing's Municipal People's Congress removed Bo from his post as deputy to the 11th National People's Congress, media report. Delegates to that body have immunity from arrest and prosecution. Embassy Beijing comments the move is a procedural step which removes a technical hurdle to prosecuting Bo; however, based on past precedent, the Chinese government might wait several months before putting him on trial. *(Ops/Embassy Beijing telcon and e-mail, AP)*

WORLDWIDE PROTESTS UPDATE

- (SBU) Embassy Islamabad anticipates small protests September 28. Consulate Lahore expects six protests in the vicinity of the consulate, varying in size from 400-1500 people. Karachi police anticipate some protests; however, leaders of religious-political parties postponed a large rally. *(Ops/Embassy Islamabad e-mail)*
- (SBU) The government of Libya reports the possibility of demonstrations in Tripoli and Benghazi September 28. *(Tripoli 63)*
- (SBU) Consulate General Kolkata reports due to possible protests scheduled for September 28 the American Center will be closed. Embassy New Delhi reports there are no known plans for protests in other parts of India September 28. *(Ops/India desk e-mail, Ops/Consulate General Kolkata e-mail)*

UN PREDICTS 700,000 SYRIANS TO FLEE BY YEAR-END

(SBU) UNHCR's latest estimate far surpasses its previous forecast of 185,000, media report. The Syria desk comments the increase represented a dramatic uptick in violence in highly populated areas, the growing sectarian nature of the conflict, and the perception hostilities will continue. The Bureau of Population, Refugees and Migration comments the UN has called for \$500 million from the international community to assist refugees. *(Ops/Syria desk e-mail, Ops/Bureau of Population, Refugees and Migration e-mail, Reuters)*

KUWAIT'S PARLIAMENT TURNS TO THE EMIR IN POLITICAL STANDOFF

(SBU) Long-running political tensions between elected parliamentarians and the government might lead anew to parliament's dissolution and fresh elections, media report. The Kuwait desk comments that while the decision currently rests with the emir, he might request the reinstated 2009 parliament take action to try to resolve the impasse. *(Ops/Kuwait desk e-mail, Reuters)*

FRANCE WILL EXPEL THOSE THREATENING PUBLIC SECURITY

(SBU) Interior Minister Valls' remarks were directed at foreigners who claim to follow Islam but do not respect France's secular traditions, laws, and values, media report. The France desk comments Valls represents the center-right wing of the Socialist Party with an image of being tough on law and order issues. The statement reflects his views, but is consistent with French policy. *(Ops/France desk e-mail, AFP)*

Susan Rice's problematic timeline

Sept. 16, via Jake Tapper:

U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations Susan Rice said the attack on the American consulate in Benghazi last week was not premeditated, directly contradicting top Libyan officials who say the attack was planned in advance.

"Our current best assessment, based on the information that we have at present, is that, in fact, what this began as, it was a spontaneous – not a premeditated – response to what had transpired in Cairo," Rice told me this morning on "This Week."

Sept. 28, via Eli Lake:

In the hours following the 9/11 anniversary attack on the U.S. consulate in Benghazi, Libya, U.S. intelligence agencies monitored communications from jihadists affiliated with the group that led the attack and members of Al Qaeda in the Islamic Maghreb (AQIM), the group's North African affiliate.

In the communications, members of Ansar al-Sharia (AAS) bragged about their successful attack against the American consulate and the U.S. ambassador, according to three U.S. intelligence officials who spoke to The Daily Beast anonymously because they were not authorized to talk to the press.

All of which has major ramifications in the battle for the next Sec. of State. Via Josh Rogin:

The two most discussed candidates to be America's next top diplomat now find themselves on opposite sides of the Libya issue, with U.N. Ambassador Susan Rice in the role of defending the administration's narrative and Sen. John Kerry (D-MA) promising tough congressional oversight while giving the State Department room to conduct its own investigation.

As the controversy over the administration's handling of the issue grows, Rice's comments on the Sept. 11 assault on the U.S. consulate in Benghazi are coming under increasing attack. ...

UPDATE (4:16 p.m.): Via Reuters:

The top U.S. intelligence authority issued an unusual public statement on Friday, declaring it now believed the September 11 attack on U.S. diplomatic facilities in Benghazi, Libya, was a "deliberate and organized terrorist attack."

The statement, by the office of Director of National Intelligence James Clapper, acknowledged that it represented a change in the U.S. intelligence assessment of how and why the attack happened. During the attack on two U.S. government compounds in the eastern Libyan city, four U.S. personnel, including Ambassador Christopher Stevens, were killed.

US officials explain Libya attack intelligence

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. intelligence officials sought to explain Friday why the Obama administration's understanding of the Sept. 11 attack on the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi is "evolving."

Facing a barrage of Republican criticism about what the administration knew and when about the attack, the Office of the Director of National Intelligence issued a statement Friday that laid out how officials came to understand the assault that killed U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans. At the same time, the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations issued a statement explaining her early descriptions of the attack.

In the days immediately after the attack, the administration said it believed it was a spontaneous reaction to an anti-Islamic video that ridiculed Islam's Prophet Muhammad and ignited mob protests on U.S. embassies around the Middle East and in North Africa. Now, the administration has begun to call it a terrorist attack carried out by al-Qaida-linked militants and explain that it was a planned attack distinct from the mob protests in the region.

Republicans have seized on the Obama administration's changing narrative, saying the administration was too slow to label it a terrorist attack because, they said, the White House did not want to admit its policies had failed to defeat al-Qaida, and quell anti-American sentiment in the Muslim world.

"Throughout our investigation we continued to emphasize that information gathered was preliminary and evolving," DNI spokesman Shawn Turner's statement said.

"It remains unclear if any group or person exercised overall command and control of the attack, and if extremist group leaders directed their members to participate. However, we do assess that some of those involved were linked to groups affiliated with, or sympathetic to al-Qaida," he said.

At the same time, a spokeswoman for U.N. Ambassador Susan Rice also sought to explain comments that Rice made early in the investigation saying there was no evidence the Benghazi attack was premeditated.

"During her appearances on the Sunday talk shows Sept. 16, 2012, Ambassador Rice's comments were prefaced at every turn with a clear statement that an FBI investigation was under way that would provide the definitive accounting of the events that took place in Benghazi," said Erin Pelton, spokeswoman for the U.S. Mission to the United Nations. "At every turn Ambassador Rice provided - and said she was providing - the best information and the best assessment that the administration had at the time, based on what was provided to Ambassador Rice and other senior U.S. officials by the U.S. intelligence community."

Further intelligence may be slow to arrive. The FBI team that arrived in Libya last week to investigate the incident can't get to the scene of the attack because it is too dangerous, according to two law enforcement officials. The officials requested anonymity because they are not authorized to speak publicly about an ongoing investigation.

Republicans have seen the Libya attack as an opportunity to attack President Barack Obama on one of his strengths, foreign policy.

Rep. Peter King, the New York Republican who chairs the House Homeland Security Committee, said on CNN that Rice's explanation on the talk shows was "such a failure of foreign policy message and leadership" and "such a misstatement of facts" that "I believe she should resign."

GOP presidential nominee Mitt Romney accused the administration of being dishonest.

"I think it's pretty clear that they haven't wanted to level with the American people. We expect candor from the president and transparency," Romney told Fox News this week.

Recent intelligence reports indicated a force of more than 50 heavily armed extremists attacked the consulate, using gun trucks for added firepower, and establishing a perimeter to limit access to the compound and catch any Americans who might try to escape. A first wave of attacks set fire to the main building, forcing the Americans to flee to a fallback building a half mile away, where a second group of extremists attacked with mortar fire. Stevens died of apparent smoke inhalation when he was caught inside the main consulate building, becoming separated from the other fleeing diplomats.

Intelligence officials have focused their attention on Ansar al-Shariah, a Libyan militant group led by a former detainee at the U.S. military-run prison in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

Gen. Martin Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said Thursday that there has been a "thread of intelligence reporting" about groups in eastern Libya trying to coalesce but no specific threat to the consulate.

Kerry Defends Ambassador Rice Against Attacks

Washington, DC – Senator John Kerry (D-Mass.), Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, issued the following statement in response to the call made by Rep. King (R-NY) for Susan Rice, U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, to resign.

"I'm deeply disturbed by efforts to find the politics instead of finding the facts in this debate. Everyone who cares about the five fallen Americans in Benghazi would do well to take a deep breath about what happened and allow Secretary Clinton's proactive, independent investigation to proceed. I'm particularly troubled by calls for Ambassador Rice's resignation. She is a remarkable public servant for whom the liberation of the Libyan people has been a personal issue and a public mission. She's an enormously capable person who has represented us at the United Nations with strength and character. Our Committee in the Senate has unanimously asked that some highly detailed, highly specific questions be answered as part of the current investigation. Congress will have plenty of time to examine those answers, and to discern what happened in Benghazi once the investigation is fully underway and the facts become clear. Tom Pickering is a good and capable man. He's respected by both parties. Let him do his job. We need to drop the politics and pull together and bring the killers of Chris Stevens and our fallen heroes to justice. Everyone needs to help the Libyans with their efforts to eliminate the militias operating outside the law. More than 30,000 Libyans took to the streets in protest against those who stormed our consulate. We need to stand with the Libyan government, empowering them to push their country along on a path toward a functioning democracy. Finally, it is important to remember

that we are all Americans first, and we cannot and should not lose sight of this fact, particularly in the face of this tragedy."

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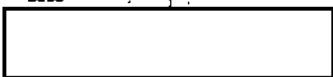

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The family told CNN during the call that it wanted to review the journal before the news media used it or alluded to it, saying the ambassador's personal writings belonged to them.

Family members said they knew Mr. Stevens kept a diary but didn't know what was in the journal obtained by CNN. The news organization initially provided the family with a transcript it prepared from the journal.

State Department officials said they then made arrangements for CNN to hand over the diary itself to an Italian diplomat in Benghazi.

The State Department enlisted the aid of the Italian envoy because U.S. diplomats evacuated the city after the Sept. 11 attack. The State Department had arranged for the Italian diplomat to safeguard the diary until it could be handed over to American officials in Tripoli. It will then be brought to the U.S., where the family will be able to take possession of it.

Family members and State Department officials said CNN agreed during the Sept. 14 conference call to hold off on using the diary until the family had a chance to review its contents.

But family members and U.S. officials were surprised when CNN anchor Anderson Cooper appeared to use the information from the journal by attributing it to a source familiar with Mr. Stevens's thinking.

In that broadcast, Mr. Cooper said the ambassador was worried about security threats in Benghazi and said he believed he was on an al Qaeda hit list.

A spokesperson for CNN said the network didn't report directly from the journal, but corroborated the information through other sources.

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"Some of that information was found in a personal journal of Ambassador Stevens in his handwriting," Mr. Cooper told viewers. "We came upon the journal through our reporting and notified the family. At their request, we returned that journal to them. We reported what we found newsworthy in the ambassador's writings."

The two leaders took note of the close cooperation and coordination between the Governments of the United States and Israel regarding the threat posed by Iran -- its nuclear program, proliferation, and support for terrorism."

Sulzberger, Publisher Who Changed The Times, Dies at 86," by Clyde Haberman (7,600 words): "Arthur Ochs ['Punch'] Sulzberger, who guided The New York Times and its parent company through a long, sometimes turbulent period of expansion and change on a scale not seen since the newspaper's founding in 1851, died on Saturday at his home in Southampton, N.Y. He was 86. His death [came] after a long illness ... Sulzberger's tenure, as publisher of the newspaper and as chairman and chief executive of The New York Times Company, reached across 34 years, ... from the era of hot lead and Linotype machines to the birth of the digital world. ... Sulzberger's insistence on [an independent voice for The Times] was shown in his decision in 1971 to publish a secret government history of the Vietnam War known as the Pentagon Papers. It was a defining moment for him and, in the view of many journalists and historians, his finest. ..."

“Sulzberger reshaped The Times. In the mid-1970s, another financially difficult period in which he might have chosen to retrench, he expanded the paper to four sections from two, creating separate sections for metropolitan and business news and introducing new ones oriented toward consumers. They were a gamble, begun in the hope of attracting new readers, especially women, and advertisers. Some critics dismissed the feature sections as unworthy of a serious newspaper. But the sections — SportsMonday, Science Times, Living, Home and Weekend — were an instant success [and] widely imitated. Over the next two decades, a billion-dollar investment in new printing facilities made still more innovations possible, among them a national edition, special regional editions and the daily use of color photos and graphics. ...

“He generally kept his hands off the editorial page ... There were, to be sure, departures from this self-imposed restraint. A notable one came in 1976, when Mr. Sulzberger insisted that The Times endorse Daniel Patrick Moynihan over Bella S. Abzug in the New York Democratic primary election for United States senator. ... Once in a while he wrote brief letters to the editor using the name A. Sock, a wordplay on Punch. Mr. Sock was always as pleased as punch with puns. ... When he left as Times chairman in 1997, he remained convinced that newspapers — at least good newspapers — had a bright future. ... ‘You’re not buying news when you buy The New York Times,’ Mr. Sulzberger said. ‘You’re buying judgment.’” <http://nyti.ms/TRLyAf>

Jeffrey Giuliano got a call from his sister next door saying that someone might be trying to break into her home in their neighborhood of attractive colonial-style houses. A brewing conflict between Congress and the Obama administration broke into the open Thursday as several lawmakers were critical about a briefing on the Sept. 11 anniversary attack on U.S. diplomats in Libya, which the administration had said was a spontaneous response to an anti-Islam video.

Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton and other administration officials held a series of closed-door briefings for members of both houses over how to conduct an independent investigation of the lethal assault on the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi, which the administration for the first time Thursday conceded was a “terrorist attack.”

But after the briefings, Republicans were openly skeptical about the information they had just been given, and even some Democrats acknowledged that the administration's initial claims don't seem to hold up. The attack last week took the lives of four Americans.

“There's increasing amount of evidence that this was a coordinated attack by terrorists,” said Sen. Marco Rubio, Florida Republican and a member of the Foreign Relations Committee. “The movie wasn't the catalyst for this. The catalyst was radical Islamic extremists that wanted to attack the United States and saw an opportunity to do it in Benghazi.”

Sen. John McCain, Arizona Republican, was openly dismissive of the administration. “I'm stunned that they thought this was some kind of spontaneous demonstration,” he told reporters.

Rep. Adam Smith, Washington Democrat and member of the House Armed Services Committee, said that while heavy weapons such as mortars weren't used until several hours after the fighting started, it was “clearly a terrorist attack,” albeit one that more resembled “an armed gang that seized an

opportunity" than a perfectly executed plot like the original Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

The developments came on another day of acute awareness among U.S. officials of growing anger in the Muslim world, as the State Department began running public service messages on Pakistani TV distancing the U.S. from the anti-Islam film that has enraged the Muslim world, and has opened investigations into the shortcomings of security for its diplomats.

On Thursday, the State Department said that embassy officials in Islamabad have paid roughly \$70,000 to buy advertising on seven Pakistani TV stations to air a public service message aimed at dampening perceptions that the "Innocence of Muslims" Internet video that denigrates Islam's Prophet Muhammad was made by the U.S. government.

Department officials said the message features a recent news clip of Mrs. Clinton saying, "Let me state very clearly that the United States has absolutely nothing to do with this video. We absolutely reject its contents."

Dubbed in the Urdu language of Pakistan, the message also features a recent clip of President Obama saying that "since our founding, the United States has been a nation of respect – that respects all faiths" and that "we reject all efforts to denigrate the religious beliefs of others."

Also Thursday, the White House reversed course and conceded for the first time that the assault that killed the Americans in Benghazi was in fact a terrorist attack.

"It is, I think, self-evident that what happened in Benghazi was a terrorist attack," White House spokesman Jay Carney told reporters traveling Thursday with President Obama aboard Air Force One. "Our embassy was attacked violently, and the result was four deaths of American officials. So, again, that's self-evident."

The remarks signal a shift in the narrative set by the Obama administration, which has resisted framing the attack as premeditated.

For more than a week since the attack, the administration had characterized it as the result of a protest triggered by anger toward "Innocence of Muslims." Skeptics have pointed out that some in the crowd were using heavy weapons, such as rocket-propelled grenade launchers, in the assault.

State and Congress

Before heading into one of the meetings on Capitol Hill on Thursday, Mrs. Clinton announced the formation of an official State Department review panel, which will examine whether security was adequate at the time of the Benghazi attack.

She told reporters that she planned to brief lawmakers on the "security posture before and during" the Benghazi attack along with "steps we have taken since to do everything we can with host governments to protect our people and our embassies and consulates."

Mr. Clinton also said she has "absolutely no information or reason to believe that there's any basis"

for reports that American Ambassador J. Christopher Stevens was operating under the fear that he

was on an al Qaeda hit list before he was killed last week in Libya.

The panel will be headed by retired Ambassador Thomas R. Pickering, Mrs. Clinton said.

It remains to be seen how U.S. lawmakers will respond to Mrs. Clinton's move to create an official panel to examine security questions that have emerged out of last week's attack in Benghazi.

Last week, the chairman and the ranking Republican of the Senate Homeland Security & Government

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The State Department deputy IG agrees with me that an independent assessment is ultimately

necessary. Sen. Susan M. Collins of Maine, the ranking Republican, said Thursday in an email

the office of the inspector general did not return calls seeking comment, but a State Department

official said without elaborating that Mrs. Collins had misconstructed the inspector general's communication to her.

However, on Thursday night, a spokesman for Mrs. Collins told the Washington Times that the State Department's inspector general investigation would be separate from that being directed by Mrs. Clinton.

Pakistan, Indonesia, Libya

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The film has been blamed for sparking widespread anti-Western demonstrations that saw American flags desecrated and U.S. Embassy walls breached in several Middle Eastern cities over the past week.

Most of the demonstrations have died down during recent days. But not in Pakistan, where anti-American sentiment was already running high, and U.S. officials are now raising fresh concerns about ongoing and potentially volatile protests near the U.S. Embassy in the capital city of Islamabad.

The U.S. Embassy in Pakistan remained open Thursday, but officials said other diplomatic posts were closed in the nation, as well as in other parts of the world where demonstrations have

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Mrs. Clinton, who appeared at the State Department after bilateral talks with Indonesian Foreign Minister R.M. Marty Natalegawa, said U.S. facilities in Indonesia – home to the world's largest population of Muslims – would be temporarily closed Friday, the Islamic holy day.

It is not unusual for U.S. diplomats to keep business hours in line with those of their host nations and, in the Muslim world, Friday is typically treated like a Sunday in the United States.

But Mrs. Clinton said U.S. officials also "want to be sure that law enforcement in Indonesia has the ability to do what it needs to do to make sure that there is no disruption of civil order and security."

With regard to the developments involving Libya, Deputy Secretary of State William J. Burns appeared Thursday in the capital city of Tripoli for a ceremony honoring Mr. Stevens and the three other Americans killed last week.

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Al Qaeda speculation

On Wednesday, Matthew Olsen, director of the National Counterterrorism Center, told the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee that the Benghazi assault was "an opportunistic attack," although he repeated the Obama administration's assertion that it was not a premeditated assault.

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Intelligence officials Thursday dismissed a news report that had suggested the attack may have been masterminded by a man who was once held by U.S. authorities at the U.S. Naval Base Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

"It is safe to assume that any significant extremist in Eastern Libya is going to be under a lot of scrutiny right now," a U.S. intelligence official told The Times. But, the official added, "Any suggestion that a leading suspect or 'mastermind' of the attack has been identified at this point is premature."

Accountability review

Federal law requires the secretary of state to convene an "accountability review board" to conduct an examination in the event of an attack on a U.S. embassy or diplomatic post like the one that occurred in Benghazi.

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But accountability review boards formed in the past have tended to include sobering and nonpolitical revelations about the security posture of U.S. diplomats.

Such revelations have generally taken about six months to come to the fore and have a tendency of being ignored by officials after the initial media frenzy surrounding an attack like the one in Benghazi has subsided.

The best example of incendiary findings dredged up by a past accountability review board may be those from the board that examined security questions that arose during the aftermath of the 1998 terrorist bombings that killed 258 people at the U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania.

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The letter was written just over two years prior to the security failures that allowed terrorists to carry out the horrific attacks of September 11, 2001, on the United States.

The coming months will tell whether the board that Mrs. Clinton has chosen to be lead by Mr. Pickering yields anything truly insightful about the posture of U.S. diplomats last week.

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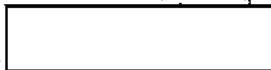

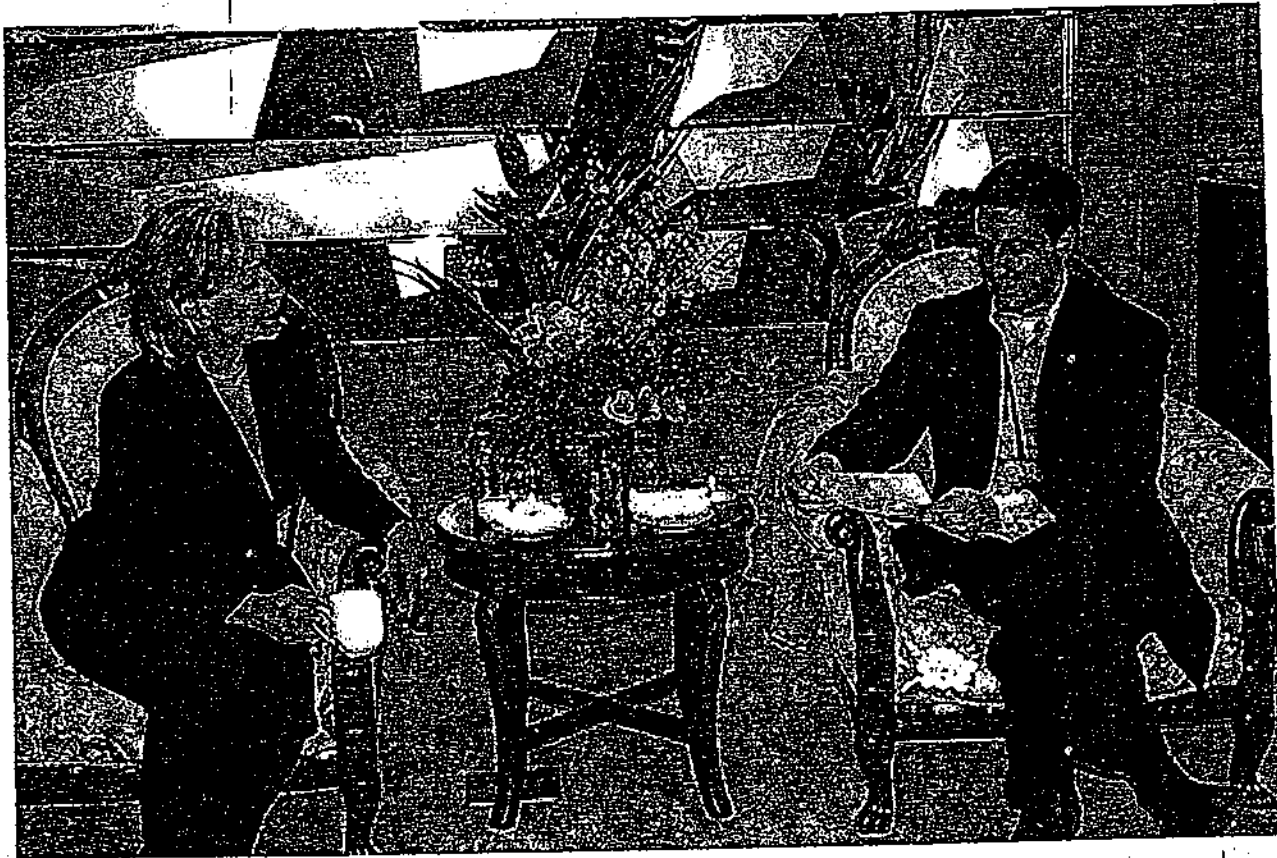

After watching on television her constantly stressing to the American potential voters that that the classified information found on her email system was only to be determined to be classified long after the fact that it been placed in her private email system, I carefully watched her testimony to the Congressional Committee I watched her tell the lie in her testimony.

Additionally this letter should provide evidence of criminal actions by Hilary Clinton and her personal and official staff, including some, who were also acting while under the pay of other persons and organizations such as the Clinton Foundation and its partners, in this crime against United States National Security. This evidence should also be used to convict those senior, major and minor employees of the United States directly involved in knowingly permitting or assisting and attempting to delay or block the Federal Investigation of this crime. Employees of the United States Government made a choice whether to be accomplices in these various criminal acts. The defense of "I was only following orders of my governmental superiors" does not work for these government employees unless they were actually enlisted employees of the US military. Only enlisted members of the US military took an oath "to the President of the United States and officers appointed over me." All military officers and civilian employees took their personal Oath to the Constitution and that oath does not mention obeying the

orders of the President nor does it mention following the orders of officers appointed over them. It is unlawful to order employees to not comply with the laws and regulations to protect national security. It is unlawful to impede a federal investigation and no employee may legally order another employee to participate in an unlawful activity. I personally know many of the highest ranking officials that were clearly involved with knowing of, permitting/allowing, ordering activities, and concealing/covering up these criminal acts on the behalf of Hilary Clinton. Many of these officials, in the past, individually earned, through deed and word, my professional and personal respect; so providing you this evidence is not done without personal sorrow for both my friends and for the Department of State and the US military, which I have been so honored to serve. Only a vigorous prosecution of Hilary Clinton and other employees involved with these crimes might prevent the repeat of unelected employees from putting the National Security of the United States at risk. As to their individual motives for being participants in criminal acts, I cannot speak; although possible reasons might be individual ambition, respect for high office/personal loyalty, belief in a cause or membership to a group such as a political party. For some it might have been a mix of more than one.

The evidence I am providing, along with what you have already acquired, should lead to convictions for the many people involved. Our President has the right to pardon federal crimes if he or she, in the future, so chooses, but America needs its Attorney General to show us that no employee of the United States Government is above its system of law and justice. What makes us unique is Our Constitution and that is why Congress passed a law specifying the exact words to be used in the oath. There are legal mechanisms by which the Constitution can be changed, but no employee individually has the power to lawfully ignore their obligation to support it.

Military Officers and USG Civilians in their Oaths swear allegiance to the Constitution unlike the military enlisted persons' oaths which are sworn to the President and officers appointed over them. This statement concerns actions taken by the former Secretary of State and US Government employees who were involved in her placing the National Security of the United States in jeopardy to its enemies both foreign and domestic. This statement will make a difference to Our Country when the leaders and employees of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Department of Justice, and the Attorney General show they share my belief in the Oath, which we each have individually taken to the Constitution.

During the time that Hilary Rodham Clinton served as Secretary of State, the Department of State (DOS) produced a daily document classified at the Secret level for consumption within DOS and other USG agencies. This document was produced within the Office of the Secretary so that all organizations with access to the DOS classified internet system could read summaries of exactly what issues were briefed personally to the Secretary of State that day. Each of these daily classified documents began each paragraph with the actual classification of the information contained in the paragraph. An investigation that compares the emails found on the private server or emails used by the Secretary will show the actual classification any text which appears to be both in the Hillary emails and in the daily classified document produced by her official office within



the Secretariat. I have personally read those classified DOS daily briefing documents while Secretary Clinton was in office.

I was not aware of the private email server and the private emails used by the Secretary to communicate officially and privately with foreign and domestic officials, family friends staff, and private individuals seeking to influence the actions of Hilary Clinton in her official role as Secretary of State Secretary Clinton, her staff (past and present) and her political supporters on her behalf have been announcing that the information in these documents were classified only after the public discovery of these private emails and the private server(s). Upon learning of this situation and listening to her saying that the information in these emails were not classified at the time they were written, I make reference to the above paragraph about the daily classified document summarizing issues presented to her on a daily basis. A comparison of information in those daily summaries with the text discovered to be in the private emails and on the private server will show a clear proof as to when information, found therein, was known to be classified.

A key piece of evidence, of who knew what was classified and when, is contained in this paragraph. This evidence will also serve as proof to show that key US Government officials within the DOS, White House and other agencies were specifically aware of the private system and that it was being used to transmit classified information known to be classified when it was being sent. On June 28, 2009 the Honduran Supreme Court instructed that President Zelaya be removed from office and the Honduran legislature selected Roberto Micheletti to take over as executive of the Honduran government. I carefully followed the reporting and news of these events as an authorized user on classified and unclassified computer systems belonging to the US Government while working for [redacted] supporting the activities of [redacted] [redacted] located in [redacted]. Since I am avoiding any classified information in this statement, I will not expand on this issue further in this letter. I am prepared to discuss this issue in much greater depth in a properly secured location and with those agents having certain TS/SCI clearances and an FBI letter showing need to know. I want to make sure, in my efforts to assist with providing evidence, that none of my actions violate national security. I would encourage the FBI and DOJ to subpoena the DOS, DOD, CIA and White House to provide copies of all the daily secret documents summarizing of the Secretary's briefings and all cables and documents dealing with what became known as the coup in Honduras. I personally read in these documents the DOS description of the issue and possible solutions. One of these documents which I read stated the Secretary will be directly sending a private communication (email?) to the American Ambassador in Honduras with her personal instructions to him which would go beyond the scope of classified instruction DOS was giving US Embassy Tegucigalpa. At that point in 2009 I thought I possessed full access to everything in the DOS system and when I was unable to locate this communication I could not figure out why. Upon learning of the private email system and private server, I instantly realized the reason for my lack of success in finding her specific instructions to the ambassador.

This document directly provides proof that the senior DOS leaders and other agencies such as the White House had full knowledge of this private email system and its use for classified communications between the Secretary of State, her staff, and American Ambassadors. This is a specifically dated document and will still exist in the files of the DOS, which was the originator of these documents, and in the files of the addressees of these documents. Please bring in former Ambassador Llorens for direct questioning by agents authorized access to TS/SCI.

Finding this particular document should be relatively simple now that you have been made aware of its existence and been shown where to look for it. Possessing it is critical to finally getting the full and rapid cooperation from key leaders in the DOS and the White House. The FBI should have been made aware that these documents exist and the fact that they can be compared with the corresponding information in the private email systems used by Secretary Clinton's Staffs, both official and private.

Early in my foreign service career one of my mentors stressed that when I was working for ambassadors that I should always avoid letting them have a poison gift, which he described as failing to advise them each time one of their requests for action must be denied because would be unlawful to permit or contrary to regulations. He included in this list; my having to warn some ambassadors of some activities which might make the Department of State look bad in the American press. Some people appointed to high positions viewed themselves as above rules and laws required of the other employees within the US Government. The Under Secretary for Management for DOS and his chiefs of security and information systems should have been able to prevent Secretary Clinton from being able to create and use this private server for classified information. I have no doubt in the FBI's and DOJ's ability to use the information in this statement to bring successful prosecutions against those who thought they or their bosses were above the law. Proper recognition must be made to the great courage that will be required by those reading this statement to see that Justice prevails in this critical situation for the future of Our Country.

I have worked closely with the DOJ and FBI for many years during my nearly [redacted] serving in the military and DOS. I am attaching a CV and my official efficiency report as




[redacted] I have included my suggestions based on my time working in key positions within the Department of State especially during times of crisis. During my time of [redacted] [redacted] would draft the document for signature for the Under Secretary for Management to formally make the DOS request to DOD to get their aid and support. The DOD has its personnel physically in the DOS operations center to manage overflight requests for DOD aircraft using airspace of other countries. Tracking these requests would be of particular interest to those investigating all actions by US Government personnel before, during, and after the killing of Ambassador Stevens.

Details on actions suggested for those members serving the Department of Justice investigating this case:

Witnesses which could be valuable to interview:



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A top/key witness should be the Executive Director of DOS/SS this person controls all personnel hired to work within the staff of the Secretariat. This person controls all funds for use by the Secretariat and staff working in the Secretary's office. This person is responsible for all property management to include equipment purchases and the IT personnel working for them. This person supports the Operations Center and can provide access to all the names of those operating in the OpsCenter and the task forces they support. These are formed to deal with a great number serious situations worldwide. The OpsCenter includes staffing directly working in that facility from other USG agencies and maintains and serves as official keeper of all documents from all the task forces, such their logs and reports to include the exact date/time of all notification and calls made to all personnel to include Secretary and her immediate staff this includes all instructions and contacts with all senior DOS officials and their duty officers. Each Regional and Functional bureau within DOS has a duty officer as well as all embassies and consulates around the world . The DOS ops center also has direct instant 24/7 contact with DOD/CIA/NSA and the White House. Detailed logs are maintained by each. Critical to interviewing this Executive Director is acquire the names and times of duty of all personnel in the ops center during such events as the entire period of the killing of Ambassador Chris Stevens crisis and verifying that the FBI has a complete record of all drafts of documents since some officials may have a personal interest in concealing whether the now-official record accurately contains the complete truth of what happened describing the actions/ roles of all key players both known and unknown. Drafts sent back and forth during the policy or public affairs approval process will give you much insight into who knew what when. 
 in the past and know how it is supposed to be done and what actually happens. There specific procedures and fill in the blank formats for all kinds requests that must be followed. 


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There will be a large number Special Security Officers (SSOs) which should be interviewed such as:

- 1) All SSOs who brought TS/SCI material to Office of the Secretary with special emphasis on those present when Secretary Clinton was briefed on material they brought.
- A) Describe procedure followed and when or if copies were made by/in the seventh floor office supporting Secretary. Normally no copies are permitted. But if they were: How were subsequent copies numbered to track who had access to them. Required is a written record. Must verify clearance of persons seeing or having access to these documents. Some special clearances have vastly more stringent rules.
- B) SSOs will have come from various USG agencies to provide briefings to only people specifically authorized by those agencies to see/read particular TS/SCI documents. They are to maintain records of the names of individuals allowed to see individual




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documents. Most TS/SCI documents will indicate if they are controlled by the original classifier of the information in that document. Only the agency as the originator the information in the document may lower the classification of the information in the document. These documents will be marked showing ORCON (Originator Controlled) meaning if another agency wants to share that information with a person or organization not having the level of clearance they must obtain the authority of the original classification authority of that information. Only the originator may lower the classification of ORCAN material. This is also used to determine who has the need to know if the originator has put other limiting criteria. The Secretary and anyone working for/with her who does not have the authority to permit anyone without that specific clearance to have access and must get written initials of those correctly authorized who are shown the document. Meeting notes must indicate the specific presence of all individuals present when the information of certain TS/SCI is discussed. This should be initialed by the individuals if done properly. NOTE: I am providing this information using only my memory and FBI agents should verify from the SSO of the DOS, DOD, CIA, NSA, NRO et al exactly the written text of all their procedures and verify that these complied with Federal Security regulations for the dates covering times period in effect when violations may have occurred. What is being looked for in this investigation should focus on deliberate acts by individuals not complying with the very specific requirements of protection of classified National Security information. Example it would take a deliberate act for a person to move classified TS/SCI information from a document or electronic device onto a device which does not have the capability to fully protect the TS/SCI information being transferred to it. A person could send TS/SCI information using an optical reader/scanner after modifying a TS/SCI document by making a copy after having deleted all the classifications from each paragraph and from the pages of the documents. This would require an enormous effort to do this regularly but is quite easy to achieve and does not require any particular skill or lengthy training. The person doing this would have to have access to the machines in the Department or at an offsite. The devices capable of doing this are to only used in properly designated areas cleared responsible for the SSO program.

C) Account for all TS/SCI brought out of DOS buildings not being carried by someone not designated as a SSO. Were any people being allowed to serve as non-pro couriers carrying TS/SCI documents brought out of DOS secure facilities? Were any TS/SCI allowed to travel with the Secretary overseas? What individuals controlled them and get statements from each individual stating how they were protected throughout time outside of DOS secure facility. This should include exactly how they were stored when not being actively used. Was there any time when these documents or devices used to transmit this level of information were not under armed guard such as Marine Security Guard or DS agent? Every time the Secretary travels to an overseas location this is mandatory. Marine Security Guards are to be present at all US embassies where TS/SCI documents or devices are present. When the Secretary travels to a foreign location ,the USMC sends trained Marine Security Guards (MSGs) to provide this service which is mandatory. The Diplomatic Security officers of DOS supervise this activity.



2) The SSO within each agency to include the DOS keeps on file all personnel granted TS/SCI clearances These files include the documents signed by the individual being "read-on" for a particular clearance. This shows exactly what are the requirements for a particular level of clearance and what must be done to protect the documents to ensure no one is allowed access and how the tracking is maintained for these particular categories. These files will include the written acknowledgement by each individual that they have been briefed on the requirements and their personal responsibilities. FBI agents investigating this case should





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A) Obtain testimonies from each person that has a TS/SCI clearance that works for Secretary's Office and travel team and at her home and other offices or sites having access to the private servers being used or receiving the emails of Hilary Clinton while she served as Secretary of State.

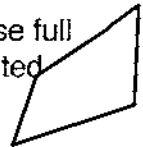
B) Verify the names of all people allowed to travel with the Secretary, who may have been present when TS/SCI documents were not concealed from view by proper cover sheets or properly stored. One should verify the level of security clearance of each such person in the travel party.

3) All Department of State DS agents should be interviewed if they were on the Secretary's detail during the time period covered by her service in particular if there was a TS/SCI document or device present outside of the Main State Seventh floor offices, especially within or outside hotels or private residences within the United States or overseas. DS agents, in addition to providing physical security to the Secretary, are charged with protecting National Security Information. They should be questioned on their observations of the protection of TS/SCI in their presence. They are outstanding men and women for whom I have the greatest respect as I served with them in many dangerous and difficult locations and have been


 They are extremely loyal, courageous and believe very much in the motto of Serve and Protect which belongs to all in the special fraternity of choosing law enforcement as a way of life. They took a personal Oath to the Constitution of the United States of America. Sadly some few among them may need need to be reminded of that Oath when questioned by the FBI. While doing so might insult many, all are professionals and are knowledgeable of how some bosses will attempt to take advantage of their characteristic of loyalty. Such bosses do exist in the Department of State, and I have been involved in their removal or personally witnessed some being protected by others high within my organization. This is infrequently a part of operating within human society, and one must choose when it is important to America, as a whole, for one to come forward. Hopefully the FBI agents in this case will find witnesses who agree that this situation is so serious that these witnesses will volunteer more information to expand your knowledge.

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As the FBI agents investigate this case, they may occasionally find people whose full loyalty is not to the Constitution but instead leans more toward politically appointed officials.



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All members of DOJ took the same oath that I did. Our Country can only continue to survive as the great Nation it is, if we live that Oath, even when doing so may damage us individually or our family's welfare. Real courage is shown when no one is looking and no other person may be aware of how an individual's action or lack of action may help or damage our society. As one who has [redacted]

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Those awards recognized my actions when I had little or no time for thought. They really belong to those who raised or trained me and to others with me during some really tough moments. Real personal courage is required of those with the time to think of the implications of their personal decisions to their careers and families.

It takes living through this experience to understand what I describe above. [redacted] a top ambassador, removed for his criminal acts even though I had been made aware before [redacted] that this ambassador had written a terrible efficiency report on [redacted] who reported other illegal activities by this Ambassador. In the earlier case, an official inspection team had been sent to the Embassy to investigate following [redacted] allegations and chose to write a "white wash" report of that situation. [redacted]

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[redacted] He wrote he did not have to comply with the DOS regulations, since the President directly put him in charge of this embassy. [redacted]

[redacted] arranged the sending of another inspection team; this time led by a senior inspector, who had twice served as ambassador and was known for his high personal integrity.
